#### The Loudest Voice isn't Always Right

The UN Security Council dissolved into chaos, with the world teetering on the brink of unprecedented peril.

In a bizarre turn of events, Russian President Vladimir Putin, on a hair transplant journey, was abducted by the Syrian National Army which issued a death ultimatum. As Russia pleaded for global peace and the safety of its "innocent citizens," the hypocrisy was palpable, given its ongoing war against Ukraine.

The session became a theatre of brutal exchanges: a triumvirate of the USA, the UK, and Ukraine clashed with Russia, China, and India. Accusations flew, and the USA's motives were branded as "Power, Profit, Influence".

Double standards dominated the discourse, with nations hurling shocking claims at one another. Tensions peaked, twice bringing the world to the precipice of nuclear conflict sparked by confrontations involving India and a joint force of the USA, UK, and China.

The air was thick with insults and inflammatory allegations, including claims from Israel, Al-Qaeda, and Iran that Donald Trump had been assassinated by Iran and had also funded 9/11.

The fate of the world hangs in the balance as this vicious exchange continues - with no end in sight.

1) How can India, struggling with domestic challenges, credibly engage in a global conference on international issues?

India is justified in helping Syria because we are in a better position than Syria.

2) (To Russia) Peace broker for Syria, warmonger for Ukraine. How does your foreign policy justify this contradiction?

Russia seeks peace within the committee. If Ukraine chooses a peaceful approach, we are willing to reciprocate. At present, our focus is on assisting Syria. #### Global War Erupts

Israel wears sunglasses not to block the sun, but to avoid looking at Gaza - a provocative remark made by the delegate of Yemen, who also claimed Yemen's identity as a nation renowned for its Islamic culture.

The delegate of Japan asserted, "Japan sends medicines, not missiles," highlighting its contributions to Iran's reconstruction and aid to Syrian refugees. Meanwhile, Turkey stated it had provided humanitarian support to Israel, a claim immediately contradicted by the Israeli delegate, who accused Turkey of hosting Hamas leadership in Istanbul and offering them diplomatic leverage.

A crisis soon erupted as the USA and China formed an unlikely alliance, countered by a Russia–North Korea coalition. War was declared, and a heated 3v3 ensued between the UK-USA-China bloc and Russia-North Korea-Yemen. Amid this, the United States accused the UK and China of playing "inky pinky ponky" with a communist ally.

A crisis update reported that a UN member was assassinated by Israeli forces. It also revealed that Yemen is allied with the Houthis and Al-Qaeda.

1) With the ongoing civil war in Yemen between the Houthis and the government, how does Yemen plan to end this conflict, deliver aid to the suffering people and account for the widespread violations of human rights?

The delegate of Yemen said that Yemen has participated in many UN-led peace talks and Yemen has tried to achieve a peaceful resolution; however, the Houthis are not agreeing to this. Yemen has sought international support and aid to guarantee that international aid reaches its citizens. Millions have been displaced in Yemen, and 377,000 people have died due to the civil war.

2) Given that stability in the Middle East hinges on regional cooperation and conflict resolution, how does the Palestinian authority intend to overcome its internal political divisions to effectively engage in unified efforts towards a lasting peace?

The delegate of Palestine said that the authority in Palestine has indeed been divided between Fatah and Hamas. However, the Palestinian Authority has openly condemned Hamas and has taken initiatives to limit its operations We have provided Gaza. humanitarian actively aid and participated United **Nations** in organisations. Our aim is to work towards a peaceful resolution between Israel and Palestine, as well as with military groups currently other involved in conflict.

# **ECOSOC**

**Economic and Social Council** 

#### Tariffs, Tipoffs and Tectonic Tensions

Day two of ECOSOC witnessed escalating tensions as Gulf nations imposed a sudden 400% tariff hike, labelled by some as economic retaliation and by others as economic vengeance. The committee, predictably, bifurcated because consensus evidently would have been far too radical a paradigm shift.

The spark was a controversial accusation of Saudi Arabia financing terrorism. In response, the Gulf bloc, led by Saudi Arabia, enacted sweeping tariffs in what they deemed a justified response to betrayal. During the heated Round Robin, the United States declared the Gulf monarchy would 'fall,' announcing 'Operation Desert Collapse.' The UK condemned the act as "economic blackmail," while Canada accused Gulf states of stealing national funds. North Korea warned of 'catastrophic consequences,' and China offered cautious understanding without full endorsement.

The conflict culminated in a 3 v 3 standoff. The Gulf bloc vs. Western powers, saw Canada dismissively label Gulf states as inferior, Iran denounced Western hypocrisy, and the U.S. asserted, "We will run the Middle East."

While delegates spoke of civilians and condemned suffering, the irony continued. Those very lives were still reduced to leverage. Behind every tariff and sanction lay more than strategy, but a silence disturbingly complicit in consequence.

The session began with the Delegate of Ethiopia stating, "Facts rather than fear - only then can we address human rights globally." In response, the United Kingdom questioned Ethiopia's credibility, citing its inability to manage its troops.

Meanwhile, the United Kingdom questions the effectiveness of sanctions in the West, arguing that they will cripple the economy, leaving no buyers. China responds by stating that they have lost its largest clients.

Allegations surfaced regarding China's rapid cyber response capabilities. Simultaneously, the UK questioned the effectiveness of Western sanctions, arguing that they would cripple the economy, leaving no buyers. China responded by acknowledging the loss of key clients due to sanctions.

#### Crisis After Crisis

Today's session witnessed intense geopolitical turmoil. Egypt was exposed for concealing Ukrainianmade nuclear weapons. Leaked communications revealed Egypt's collaboration with extremist groups to deploy these weapons against Israel and France. This revelation triggered global outrage, with Egypt and Ukraine facing sharp condemnation.

The crisis deepened when the USA backed anti-Semitic and anti-muslim KAMAJ overthrew the Federal Republic of Germany's Government. This led to a dramatic shift in global alliances. In an unexpected move, Israel extended support to Islamic nations. Turkey called upon all Asian nations to withdraw from NATO. Iran and the Democratic People's Republic of Korea began to support the USA.

Numerous threats and accusations followed, yet no resolution was achieved by press time. The events highlighted the volatility of international relations, where decades-old alliances crumbled in minutes. The session ended without consensus, reflecting the fragility and unpredictability of modern diplomacy.

1) You stated yesterday that you support non-state actors having access to nuclear weapons. How can you justify this stance, knowing it would increase terrorism and civilian suffering?

The Delegate of the Democratic People's Republic of Korea: It is only for nuclear deterrence. The USA should not be the only one allowed to bully others. Terror organisations should also have the power to intimidate the common person. This is acceptable for North Korea, as we do not have any non-state actors.

The Delegate of **Pakistan** expressed his disdain over India's decision split Jammu Kashmir into two Union Territories. Instead of responding, you remained silent. Why did you hesitate? Did you lack the resolve or do you silently agree with his claim?

The Delegate of India: India does not agree with Pakistan's statement. The abrogation of Article 370 was carried out solely for the welfare of the people.

The Delegate of the United States of America: We do have the capacity to get it back. We do not consider Afghanistan to be a weak country. If we want to retrieve the weapons, we can.We are not doing so because we do not want to increase the number of nuclear missiles in our country.

#### *'Development Programme or Therapy Programme?'*

Diplomacy met drama as alliances crumbled and power dynamics shifted. Ukraine opened by accusing the USA of neglecting the Global South, prompting the USA to cut its funding. Ukraine then allied with Switzerland and launched a scathing attack on the UK for past exploitation and present instability, urging the committee to stop "mistaking discussion for development."

A fiery 1v1 between Russia and Ukraine escalated into a 2v2 with the USA joining Russia and Afghanistan siding with Ukraine. The USA and Russia accused Ukraine of hypocrisy and called for its removal from the UN. Tensions peaked as James Bond revealed ties with North Korea, triggering a major crisis. Bond and Afghanistan clashed with Russia and the USA, who felt betrayed. North Korea retaliated by obliterating the UK and attacking Germany.

A special majority vote barred Ukraine for 15 minutes. The delegate returned dramatically - this time as China.

1) (To USA) Does the international community apply double standards to Israel or Palestine?

Some say Israel is unfairly targeted, while others argue Palestinian suffering is overlooked.

Ans: No, the United Forum does not apply double standards to Israel and Palestine; all the aid we give, we give to Israel as well as Palestine. The US supports everything in the name of defense.

North Korea uses these nuclear weapons as a defense. We do not want to be the next Libya or Ukraine. We do not want to let our guard down; we want to keep our civilians safe.

#### Wa-kanda Crisis is this?

After a thrilling debate among the nations of India, Pakistan, Iran, Mexico, the United Kingdom, and Sudan on topics such as healthcare, immigration, and drug trafficking, countries battled using Points of Information as ammunition and carefully researched answers as defence.

This was followed by a vibranium crisis, which resulted in the USA receiving a monopoly from Wakanda. Countries entered into a round-robin to debate the ethical actions of Wakanda in granting sole ownership of this metal to the USA. Conversations sparked on the just distribution of the metal, especially since it was found in Antarctica. The argument against the USA's monopoly was led by Ukraine, which opposed the ownership of this scarce metal as it was needed for their country, currently enduring a three-year-long war.

1) Is Russia's AI ambition just a digital disguise for a polluting economy?

The Delegate of Russia: Russia is a major energy exporter, and we do not deny it. But we are not pretending to be climate messiahs like the USA, who build major fossil fuel centres while preaching net zero.

2) Will the USA ever hold Silicon Valley responsible for its emissions, or is economic interest always going to outweigh climate responsibility?

The Delegate of the USA: Companies like Microsoft launched their AI for Earth program, awarding over 850 grants across more than 110 countries to deploy AI for environmental conservation. These projects span the globe, demonstrating that U.S. AI tools are not only ready but already reducing emissions and protecting ecosystems worldwide.

3) How does China justify its carbon footprint while claiming to be a leader in green AI initiatives under the Paris agreement?

The Delegate of China: China's AI development aligns with our carbon goals. We're building AI-specific data centers powered by renewables and nuclear energy. More importantly, we use AI to optimize logistics, energy grids, and carbon monitoring, using it to fight climate change, not fuel it.


#### Charity or Responsibility?

"We contribute to less than 0.3% global emissions, yet we face droughts, floods and devastation," was a statement repeatedly echoed by the delegates. The delegate of North Korea stated that developed countries must bear the responsibility of contributing to the climate funds, considering that those very countries had exploited nations rich in fertile lands and abundant natural resources to gain profit for themselves.

Numerous delegates cited in their speeches that they thought India and China should be considered developed countries, as they are some of the largest carbon dioxide emitters; they had grown significantly since the \$100 billion finance commitment was made and should also contribute to the climate fund. India countered this by saying that it has a low per capita income, significant income inequality, and still has a lot of growing to do before it can be considered a developed nation.

The United States was called out by the delegate of Belgium for not meeting its obligations, contributing approximately \$21 billion to \$40 billion less than the \$100 billion annually it had promised in the Paris Agreement. The delegate was at a loss for words and did not end up replying to this accusation.

1) How can you say you are working toward net zero by 2050 if you're still using so many fossil fuels to increase your economy?

The Delegate of Denmark: It is a source of trade to increase our revenue, allowing us to invest more in an eco-friendly environment. Even if a country invests in oil refineries or extraction, it is to boost the economy and create a strong revenue source, so they don't have to depend on it in the future.

2) Egypt wants developed countries to give more than \$100 billion in climate funds, but also says that repaying funds is a burden. How can you ask for more while saying it's too stressful to pay back? What is your solution?

The Delegate of Egypt: Egypt requires more than \$100 billion in funds due to the actions of said developed countries that have caused problems in our soils and agriculture. We recommend paying back half of the funds that we receive.

3) Bangladesh has made efforts in climate action, but what are you doing to make sure these efforts are long-term and not just short-term solutions?

The Delegate of Bangladesh: We are investing heavily in our adaptations, but climate change is a global problem, caused by global emissions. We advocate transparency at every step of the way.

All India Political Parties Meet Senior

#### Mumbai Besieged: A Nation Held Hostage, A City Brought to its Knees

What began as a seemingly unremarkable morning has curdled into a spectacle of modern anarchy. Mumbai, the monolithic nerve centre of Indian finance, film and identity now gasps under the suffocating grip of a multi-pronged terror siege that has left 42 dead, dozens maimed and a nation spiralling into uncertainty.

The attackers, believed to be operatives of Lashkar-e-Taiba, executed their carnage with surgical precision. CST Station, a Metro train, and Wankhede Stadium were struck in rapid succession - not just for destruction, but for maximum symbolic impact. Amid the wreckage, Virat Kohli, India's sporting pride, was abducted. At 7:30 p.m., an encrypted transmission pierced Parliament: Kohli, shackled and flanked by masked militants, issued a ransom demand - \$100 million in Bitcoin to a Cayman address. This was no negotiation; it was performance warfare.

Mumbai was locked down. The BSE plunged 12.3%, and Maharashtra teetered on fiscal collapse. An NSG unit, dispatched two days late, breached Wankhede to find only shadows and silence. Intelligence suggests an abandoned textile precinct, 2.8 km from the stadium, as their possible hideout.

"This is not terrorism," remarked Dr. Meera Chaturvedi. "This is algorithmic insurgency. Precision-coded chaos. A psychological colonisation of national memory."

As Parliament descends into procedural paralysis and the military postures on high alert, the question lingers: Will India respond with calculation, fury or fracture?

The clock ticks. The fault lines deepen. And somewhere beneath the city's fractured skyline, three spectres move unseen, rewriting the rules of war with every breath

1) To Amit Shah (Home Minister): Given the abysmally low conviction rate under UAPA, should the law not be amended to prevent its misuse rather than justify endless pretrial detentions?

In a private briefing, Shah reportedly dismissed the premise, claiming the fault lies not with the law but the slow judiciary. Revising arrest protocols, he argued, is like asking a soldier for moral clarity mid-battle. His doctrine: pre-emption is protection, and restraint is betrayal.

2) To Rahul Gandhi (Congress Leader): If Congress acknowledges UAPA's misuse, why has it failed to introduce a repeal or reform bill: even in states under its governance?

Caught in a corridor exchange, Gandhi conceded that an internal draft for reform was floated, then abandoned. Too many factions, too many fears. No one, he admitted, wanted to wear the badge of 'soft on terror' in an age of populist optics.

3) To Akhilesh Yadav (Samajwadi Party Chief): Why has your party never legislatively challenged UAPA, despite acknowledging wrongful arrests during your tenure?

Yadav, in a leaked meeting, admitted past excesses but insisted real change happens in the streets, not the chambers. A justification of noise, not action.

#### Mumbai Besieged: A Nation Held Hostage, A City Brought to Its Knees

In a bizarre turn of events, Elon Musk, through Starlink, declared war on the Indian Parliament during a session with a parliamentary committee. He accused political leaders of negligence, extremism, and corruption, which stirred up chaos and reignited tensions among party factions.

From behind bars, Arvind Kejriwal denied any bribery claims, insisting he had no access to any machines.

1) Mr. Kejriwal, in light of the recent exam paper leak incidents in Delhi, what concrete measures is your government taking to ensure accountability and prevent such breaches in the future?

### Accusation and Penalties: Rivals emerge, and Truth reveals itself

Today's committee session began with the Manchester United delegate claiming that "technology in football is misunderstood" and "perfection cannot be expected from human eyes." FC Barcelona challenged this, citing Manchester United fan groups demanding the removal of VAR and GLT. The Manchester delegate responded that justice takes precedence over fan sentiment.

Nottingham clarified they opposed the implementation, not VAR itself. Tensions escalated when former Manchester player Roy Keane alleged VAR interference, potentially overturning favourable club decisions. Barcelona accused Real Madrid of bribing Keane to frame them, leading to a heated 1v1 debate and Barcelona's delegate being barred for inappropriate language. Manchester was then questioned on whether Keane was a hero or traitor; the delegate requested time to respond via chit. The session ended in turmoil, with clubs deeply divided over VAR's integrity.

The central question moving forward remains: will the committee prioritise truth or loyalty?

1) (To Real Madrid) Your club has been involved in several VAR controversies, with Real Madrid TV airing weekly referee critiques, prompting legal threats from the referees' union. How do you respond to concerns that this breaks public trust in officiating and VAR? What concrete steps will you take to show your stance is about fairness, not influence?

The Delegate of Real Madrid stated that "RM TV is a stance for the freedom of speech the club possesses, and if any VAR issues occur for them, they hold the right to talk about them on it." They also state that "they cannot be held responsible for how this affects the referee's personal life or the actions the fans take, as it is not possible to control all of them."

2) (To Barcelona) After a disputed match vs. Rayo Vallecano, your manager backed VAR despite criticism. With growing calls to release VAR audio and improve transparency, will your club support reforms like public referee explanations or live audio feeds to ensure trust and accountability?

The Delegate of Barcelona states that believe "they that the current implementation of VAR is flawed," they would like certain standardized protocols to be made that increase transparency as well, because "it would help all clubs present and the fans understand the referee's decision better and prevent them from jumping to conclusions."
